

Dear friends and supporters,

We're thrilled to welcome you to the 2024 annual report for Colorado Farm to Table (CFIT). The past year has been a year of growth as we reached even more people than the year before and brought on many more volunteers.

In 2024, CFTT continued to do what it does best: growing and harvesting fresh produce to put on the plates of hungry Colorado residents. Our partners shared with us that those who access their services are quick to choose our produce. With packaged/canned food being cheaper than fresh produce, receiving CFTT's produce free of charge ensures they receive healthier food for consumption.

This has never been more urgent than the time we find ourselves in. At the beginning of 2025, lost access to \$5.5 million due to federal funding reductions. This has created a massive gap in access to nutritious food and could potentially lead to higher food insecurity across our counties.

CFTT is proud to be part of the solution amidst this crisis, donating fresh, healthy, and locally grown produce to feed people from all walks of life. In fact, our yield and the number of people we reached grew exponentially—from 68,282 pounds of produce and 56,902 individuals served in 2023 to 98,000 pounds, 81,667 individuals served in 2024.

With changing times, our approach is evolving to embrace a more sustainable approach to stewarding the land. As of 2024, we have successfully eliminated the use of synthetic herbicides and insecticides, ensuring the health of our soil and well as providing organic food.

We couldn't do any of this without you - the volunteers who get up with the sun to pitch in at the farm, the distribution partners who are that critical connection point with the people who need our food, and the generous donors who share our belief that everyone deserves equitable access to fresh and healthy food.

A sincere and profound thank you to everyone who has been part of this journey so far. We hope you'll all stay tuned for what comes next, as we look to the future with some new and exciting ideas for growing our mission and our impact.


MISSION

Who We Are

Colorado Farm To Table (CFTT) creates access to nutritious vegetables for Colorado's most vulnerable, and is the **only organization in Colorado** growing and **donating 100% of its produce** to organizations feeding food-insecure residents at no cost.



The issue

In 2022 the average cost for a meal in Colorado was \$4.13, with food insecure Coloradans needing \$521,298,000 more per year to meet their food needs. **671,340 people faced hunger, of which 172,280 were children**.

Colorado Governor, Jared Polis, recently stated that the **USDA funding cuts nullified the \$5.5 million** that Colorado would have otherwise received to strengthen local food systems, support farmers, and food producers, and help supply food banks.



Our unique solution

CFTT grows, harvests, and donates fresh, healthy, sustainably grown produce, at no cost, specifically to organizations feeding food-insecure Colorado families struggling to put food on their tables. Each year, we harvest approximately 100,000 pounds of sweet corn, summer, and winter squash, cabbage, and broccoli.

Our unique volunteer-driven model helps keep our costs low so we can grow and donate 100% of the nutritious produce each year - on a modest budget.

Our farm is engaged in multi-year practices to transition to more sustainable and regenerative farming. We want to preserve and maintain healthy soil and water for generations to come.
